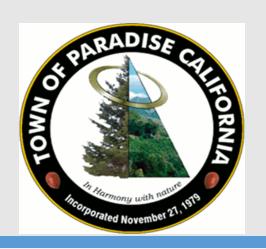

2016/17 Operating and Capital Budgets

- ➤ Adopted June 20, 2016
- ➤ All transactions are recorded and the audit is in progress
- Financial Statements and Independent Auditors Report will be issued December or January.



2017/18 Operating and capital budgets

- >Adopted June 27, 2017
- Three months of transactions recorded

- CIP Matching Funds



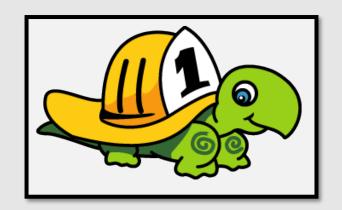
GENERAL FUND UPDATE

Code Enforcement Program

- Slow but Steady progress on addressing hazardous and blighted properties in Paradise
 - Lowering police calls for service and increasing local property values
- Recent focus on large outdoor marijuana grows have eliminated most
 - \$13,000 was budgeted for public nuisance (including marijuana) and \$26,525 received to date. Recommend increasing budget to \$28,000



Fire Department



When appropriate the Town rented apparatus to the State during 2017 fire season



 Surplused 81 earned rental income by acting as reserve engine nearby Rental income budget is \$75,000 and \$98,794 has been recorded to date



- Fire Chief estimates at least another \$25,000 coming
- Recommend budget increase to \$125,000 and transfer out of \$50,000 for future apparatus replacement

Staff continues efforts to sell Engine 81

 2016/17 CAL FIRE contract savings and additional 2017/18 rental income has replaced cash flow reserves temporarily used to fund new fire engine

Measure C



- On October 24, 2017, the quarterly Measure C Citizens Oversight Committee meeting was held and the final 4th quarter 2016/17 and the 1st quarter 2017/18 reports to date were approved.
- 2016/17 concluded with receipts of \$1,355,070
 - This is a 9.6% increase in receipts from 2015/16
- \$1,328,363 was used in 2016/17 to maintain public safety services and replace essential operating equipment

Potential Measure C 2017/18 budget adjustments

Revenues

- Increase Budget to \$1,368,621 from \$1,335,000
- Revenue continues to trend upward
- This assumes 1% increase from 2016/17

K9 Program Support

- Decrease Budget to \$11,000 from \$13,000
- 2015/16 Actual \$9,514 and 2016/17 Actual \$10,516

Police Roof Replacement

- Decrease Budget to \$47,000 from \$75,000
- \$46,622 spent in 2017/18 to date

Fleet Repair Facility Construction

- Increase Budget to \$60,000 from \$0
- There are currently no facilities or lift for repairing fire engines or other large equipment

10% Fixed Reserve

- Increase reserve to \$203,710 from \$188,000
- To align Town Council requested 10% fixed reserve with projected revenues

Animal Control Challenges

- Chronic EmploymentVacancy
 - Trying to fill Animal Control Officer position since May 2017
 - Must start over and go out again for applications

Represents the Town in Delicate Situations

- Responds to dangerous dog calls
- Issues citations for code violations
- Utilizes judgement in disputes
- Witness in hearings and court

Vacancies draw resources from other Divisions Impacts Police, Finance and HR

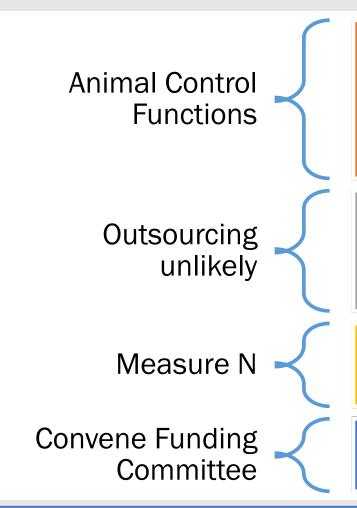
Animal Control Service Operations Budget

Town of Paradise

\$325,000 budget provides 112 hours of animal control services & 20 hours of public shelter \$301,000 limited 40 hours of animal control service & 45.5 hours of public shelter

City of Oroville

Animal Control Service Funding Considerations



- Disposal of over 100 deer per year
- 30+ annual hearings for dangerous dogs
- Enforce the rabies prevention
- 1,000+ incidents reported each year
- Butte Humane Society discussions since June 2017
- Receptive to possible sheltering options
- No capacity for Animal Control Functions
- \$12 per parcel provides \$132,362
- Short \$190,000 per year
- Continue discussion on funding alternatives
